PROPOSED TELETHEATRE ESTABLISHMENT WOODBINE ENTERTAINMENT/BIG STAR RESTAURANT

Recommendation

The Commissioner of Planning recommends:

"THAT the Ontario Racing Commission be advised that Council has no objection to the proposed teletheatre wagering use within the Big Star Restaurant located at 70 Interchange Way."

Purpose

In a letter dated October 19, 2001, Big Star Restaurants Inc. has requested Vaughan Council's endorsement of a proposed teletheatre wagering operation (off-track betting on horse racing), operated by Woodbine Entertainment, within their restaurant located at 70 Interchange Way.

Background - Analysis and Options

Teletheatres must be licensed by the Provincial Government. The Ontario Racing Commission issues a license to operate a teletheatre to a racetrack for a particular site; it does not license the restaurant or bar. It is the Ontario Racing Commission's policy to require input from the local municipality for the specific site. Attached is an information fact sheet issued by the Ontario Racing Commission on Teletheatres in Ontario.

The City's Zoning By-law 1-88 does not permit a teletheatre or off-track wagering as a permitted use. However, off-track wagering may be permitted as an accessory use to an existing eating establishment, provided such accessory use is naturally and normally incidental, subordinate to, and devoted exclusively to the main use.

The distribution network proposed for the teletheatre in the Big Star Restaurant consists of 30 – 40 monitors (television sets) and some computer installation, which would be operated by Woodbine Entertainment. This use would occupy approximately 2,300 sq.ft (18%) of the restaurant's total gross floor area (12,400 sq.ft). The existing restaurant/bar concept would not change and access would be gained to the teletheatre via the restaurant. The proposed teletheatre wagering use appears accessory to the eating establishment use and therefore would be permitted.

Conclusion

Planning Staff has no objection to the proposed teletheatre operation within the Big Star Restaurant, as it is considered an accessory use to the main restaurant use, and is therefore permitted by By-law 1-88. Should Council concur, a resolution is provided which would be forwarded to the Ontario Racing Commissioner as Vaughan's input.

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ATTACHMENT NO. 1

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Teletheatres in Ontario

Teletheatre wagering or off-track belifng is a distribution system for betting on horse racing in Outpro whereby a facot rack toensed by the Ontario Racing Commission sets up pari-matuel systems and satellite feeds in locations away from the raceticals.

The primary objective of telepheatro wagering in Omano is to provide an additional distribution network for moise racing by supplying this form of enterfavorant to existing hosinoses with existing Clantele was might not normally attend at the racetrack. Surveys across North America are consistent in identifying that only 2% of the population afterd races and the racing industry has endorsed telepheatre wagering as a vehicle to huld out it's market share.

When the Government of Onterio approved teletheatre wagering it was envisaged that it would be procentrated in sports bar type feet test with existing previous introducing new fans to howevering.

Teleihooire wageing is auchorized by the Colomat Chan Regulations administered by the Canadian Part-Mulget Agency of Agriculture Canadia. The Regulations require that telethesites be owned and operated by cacelracks under conditions bullmed in the Regulations. One of these regulations requires that teletheatres must be thensed by the Provincial Government.

The Commal Code Regulations require that leteshablins must provide sealing, sarvo food and beverages, and have washroom facilities. In broad terms, the regulations describe the hasic requirements for a promise holding a side lineaux from the Alcohol and Carning Commission of Origina. This, together with the conscious decision of the Government to provide support to existing businesses at the highly competitive adspitably industry. Has resulted in the eithertims being set up in Equationary decision to look into the physical acceptability of promises, as they are already toensed by a provincial regulator and must have met the stringent requirements of the figural legenting process.

The terminitiquor Ellence Roard of Ontario deemed latethcatro operations in it censed premises to be entertainment ancillary to the sale and structe of beverage alcohol and food. The Soard rules that tetetheatro wagering definot constitute an "other business" (operation of ausinesses other than the sale and service of beverage alcohol and food in a licensed premise is contrary to the 1 quor Emerce Act) as the incense is not involved in the operation of the tetetheatro. The actus operation of the tetetheatro is staffed and supervised by the received by the Ontario Raping Contrassion and operating under a wagering period from the Canadian Pari-Matuel Agency, and all the revenues from betting are returned to the racing industry. Entrance foce are considered cover charges for entertainment under the Equar Regulations.

The Ontario Racing Commission issues a licence to operate a teletheatre to a recetrack for a particular site; it does not licence the bar or the restaurant. To alk will exhibit, the Commission does not specify the type of promise that total leafnes must operate in and as a result they can be located in cubs, line dirent mores, sports bars, bowling alleys, hotels and even a sandwith shop.

It is Organia Record Commission policy to require input from the local municipal government for the specific site. As part of the incersing processes, the Colland Racing Commission (equires the recettack to submit correspondence from the **municipality advising the Commission of** any objections.

The felter from the rounidipality can take the form of a letter from the Clerk, the Mayor, mainlogal official or can be a formal Council resolution, it is the municipality's decision to respond as they see lit

This also Economission policy to review the licence of any existing telepheatre when correspondence is received from the local manipipality pullting the particular greyance. The Contarto Raung Commission appreciates the issues surrounding any excansion of socially sensitive according. This policy of the Commission has given the municipalities a comfort level to allow teachesive wagning to be implemented.

Currently there are closs to 90 teletheatres, inspect and in operation across Ontario

Proposal

Existing Restaurant/Bar/Cafe; 8ig Star Café Valighan
Total Area of the Existing Establishment; 12,400 Square Feet
Area of the Proposed Teletheatre; 2,300 Square Feet
The Teletheatre will occupy approximately 18,5% of the total area of the
existing Restaurant space. The Teletheatre operation would be run by
Woodbine Entertainment. The proposed set up would only require the
addition of 30-40 Monitors (Television Sets) and some computer
installation. The existing Restaurant/Bar concept would not change.
