VAUGHAN FIREFIGHTER COMBAT CHALLENGE TEAM REQUEST FOR FUNDING

Recommendation

The Fire Chief in consultation with the Director of Budget and Financial Planning recommends:

1. That the City of Vaughan Council approves support of the Vaughan Fire Fighter's Combat Challenge Team in the sum of \$11,942 for the current year 2003, with the source of funding being the Fire Department Operating Budget Sundry Account.

<u>Purpose</u>

The Vaughan Fire Fighter's Combat Challenge Team has competed in numerous Local, Regional, National and International Challenge events over the past several years, being quite successful in winning the Women's Team and Individual Championships—setting world-record times! The Team has undertaken fund raising events to offset much of their expenses and request funding support for the remainder of their expenses for the various competitions this year.

Background - Analysis and Options

The Firefighter Combat Challenge tests skills each year in competitions involving fire departments. The Vaughan Fire and Rescue Service Firefighter Combat Challenge Team consists of a group of Vaughan's professional firefighters who, in addition to their ongoing fire, rescue and first aid training, work to maintain top physical condition to better serve the community and to compete in the Challenge. The Team travels throughout North America competing in events and attempting to qualify for the World Championship event.

In the Team's short history of competition, they have seen their Women's Team capture the National and go on to win the World Championship. In 2002, Firefighter Esther DeBoer has shattered the World-record time to win the National Championship, and Firefighters Lisa Belanger and Jacqueline Rasenberg finished 4th and 5th.

The competitions have resulted in significant media attention for Vaughan's Firefighter Combat Challenge Team. Interviews have been conducted by: TSN, ESPN, Discovery, CBC, CityTV and CFTO. There has been extensive newspaper coverage of the competitions and many articles have appeared in the Toronto Sun, The Liberal and The Vaughan Weekly.

The City of Vaughan has been introduced to untold numbers of viewers across North America especially as the World Championships are re-run on TV for many months after the event. The Combat Challenge participation has shown what a strong municipality the City of Vaughan is and how exceptional the protection is of its citizens and businesses. Vaughan is also viewed to be very progressive in having the first-ever female firefighter team. Last year at the Canadian Nationals in Windsor, five of the 20 female competitors from across Canada, were Vaughan Firefighters!

The costs of competing are substantial. While the Team has been able to raise some funds and receive some donations from local supporters, additional financial support from the City is requested. The estimated total expenses for year 2003 is \$23,884 of which they believe they can raise about half of that amount, in various fund-raising and other sponsorship initiatives.

In 2001 and 2002, Council approved \$9,500 and \$10,750 respectively, in funding, from the Operating Budget-Corporate Contingency Account, while the 2003 Operating Budget Fire Department Sundry Account is identified for the current source of funding.

Conclusion

The City of Vaughan Firefighter Combat Challenge Team's competitiveness, performance and ambassadorship have been stellar. Their success and media exposure has brought great pride and recognition to the City of Vaughan and the Vaughan Fire and Rescue Service. Council's consideration of this funding request is greatly appreciated.

Budget Request

For the Year 2003 Competitive Season



Introduction

Each year fire departments across Canada test their individual skills against each another in the Firefighter Combat Challenge. The Vaughan Fire and Rescue Service's Firefighter Combat Challenge Team consists of a group of the city's professional firefighters. In addition to their ongoing fire, rescue and first aid training, these firefighters work to maintain top physical condition to better serve our community and to compete in the Challenge. The team travels throughout North America competing in events, striving to qualify for the World Championship and introducing people to the great City of Vaughan.

Last Year

Last year the team continued to set some impressive records. The 2003 National Women's Champion was once again a Firefighter from Vaughan. Firefighter Esther Deboer won the title narrowing edging out the 2002 National Champion, Vaughan Firefighter Lisa Belanger. The World Champion Women's Relay team captured another National title setting a new world record by 14 seconds. The women also captured several top spots in the regional events. The men's crew continues to improve every year, setting new personal and team records. The men's relay team also won a bye to the finals in the Men's Relay Event by placing second in their regional event. Although, the men turned in their best time ever at the Nationals, only Firefighter Dave Smith qualified to compete in the finals. Both Men's and Women's Relay team was narrowly beaten by a hard charging team of young firefighters from Mississauga Fire. Individually, Firefighter Deboer had a costly fall in the finals but Firefighter Belanger came away with an impressive 4th place finish in what was the toughest field of women competitors ever. The Men's team was beat out by a fellow Canadian team that eventually placed 5th in the world.

Two Time World Champions

The Women's Relay Team won the World Championships in 2000 and again in 2001. The team also has won three National Relay titles, setting a new world record, which still stands. The Women's team success is even more amazing since, they only compete with 3 women, compared to all the teams from the larger US department who race with 5 women. The team has been nicknamed **Vaughan's Triple Threat**. Firefighter Lisa Belanger, Firefighter Jacqueline Rasenberg and Firefighter Ingrid Van Gelder are huge reason why the Women's Divisions have grown so rapidly. Every one knows and fears the women of Vaughan.

Media Attention

The team is definitely the talk of the combat challenge circuit. The team is extremely photogenic and are backed up by their outstanding results. During the TSN broadcast of the Canadian National Championship, our team received a substantial amount of airtime both on and off the course. The broadcast included interviews taped in Vaughan and footage of the firefighters in action in the city. The Team has been on the front page of the various local cities' papers and interviewed by TSN, ESPN, Discovery network and CBC. We have had local interviews on CityTV and CFTO, plus articles in the Toronto Sun, The Liberal and many articles in the Vaughan Weekly. The women also did an excellent article in a US based women's health magazine called Oxygen.

Promoting the city

We have been able to introduce the City of Vaughan to thousands of people across North America. Our various fundraising events allow the team to meet with the taxpayers of Vaughan, as representatives of the city. We have shown everyone the quality of the men and women that serve the citizens and businesses of Vaughan everyday. The team also demonstrates how progressive the city is by having the first ever, all female firefighter team.

The team also was asked to put on a demonstration of the Firefighter Combat Challenge at the Markham Fair last fall. The event turned out to one of the best demonstrations at the fair and the firefighters of Vaughan were the highlight of the show.

Financials

We enjoy competing but the costs involved in competing successfully are substantial. The Vaughan Firefighter Combat Challenge Team needs your support for the upcoming season. Last year, the team was funded by the team members with some help from the Fire Department and with the support from some generous sponsors. We anticipate working with these sponsors again next year, but we still need additional financial support.

We have estimated our expenses for the 2003 season to be approximately \$23,883.59. We are confident that we can raise at least half of the required funds. We are asking the City of Vaughan to support us with \$11,941.80. This will enable us to compete with cities like Toronto, Ottawa and Vancouver.

Next Year

Presently, we are negotiating with McDonalds Canada for sponsorship, including the possibility of producing the first ever Co-ed Firefighter Calendar, to be launched during Septembers 2003, fire safety week. Our goal is to make the calendar an annual project allowing the team to be financially self-sufficient.

The Firefighter Combat Challenge was developed to showcase physical fitness, inside the fire service. The competition hi-lites doing the job safer and better.

Three to five-person teams compete individually against the clock wearing full turnout gear (helmet, coat and pants with liners, boots, and gloves) weighing approx. 35lbs while breathing from SCBA.

The event tasks are timed and completed sequentially. 3 lights and beeps sound, then time starts when the pack is picked up and stops when a beam is crossed at the finish line.



The tasks are:

Task 1: Stair Climb with High Rise Pack

Carry a standard high-rise pack (2-50 ft sections of hose--approx. 42 lbs) to the top of a five story tower. The pack is deposited into the designated area.

Task 2: Hose Hoist

From the top of the tower, pull a 5/8 inch rope to hoist a donut roll of LDH hose (45 lbs). This evolution is complete when the donut roll clears the rail and is dropped into the designated area on the floor. Then run downstairs, touching every step.

Task 3: Forcible Entry

Using the 9-lb shot mallet and Force Machine, drive a 165 lb I-beam five ft, which simulates chopping into a roof for ventilation.

Task 4: Hose Advance

After moving a distance of 140 ft around 6 hydrants, pick up a nozzle and move a 1 3/4 inch charged hose straight forward for 75 ft (approx. 300 lbs), crack the nozzle, hit a designated target and place the nozzle on the pavement.

Task 5: Victim Rescue

Drag a 175 lb victim (Rescue Randy) a distance of 100 ft backwards. This event (and the course) is complete when the beam is broken across the finish line.

All competitors are medically cleared fire/rescue personnel, since these tasks, like firefighting, require near maximal effort. An acceptable time is 5:00 minutes and an excellent time is 3:00 minutes or less. The top placing team from each Regional Event earns a bye into the final day of the Canadian National Championships. Teams with a time of 9:00 minutes or less qualify for the 'Wild Card Day' at the Canadian National Championship.
