Background

The Economic & Technology Development Department has completed a new four-piece series of Community Profiles for distribution to the Chamber of Commerce, City Departments, government agencies, realtors, developers, investors, residents and ratepayer associations.

The Community Profiles for Concord/Thornhill/Carrville; Maple; Woodbridge; Kleinburg and Rural Areas were produced to address requests for community-specific demographic data. Each profile provides an overview of key demographics characteristics including population growth, income, ethnicity, housing, education, family structure, labour force and the local economy. In addition, current and future developments were highlighted as well as key attractions and shopping areas.

Purpose

The purpose of the Community Profiles is to provide investors, businesses and residents with a "flavour" of the individual communities that comprise Vaughan. A fifth profile focusing on employment areas is currently in production. This profile will feature data on employment composition, business clusters, growth trends, employment lands and construction activity. With this publication, business investors will have another tool to assist in making an informed decision on relocation and expansion opportunities in Vaughan.

The Community Profiles are available in hardcopy and electronic format via the City's website.



KLEINBURG & RURAL AREAS

Population

The 2001 Census established the resident population of Kleinburg and the adjacent rural areas of northern Vaughan at **3,918**. An additional **668** individuals reside in rural areas north and east of Maple. About **2.5%** of the City of Vaughan's inhabitants reside in Kleinburg and Rural Areas. The community of Kleinburg constitutes all areas surrounding Islington Avenue from Major Mackenzie Drive to Highway 27. The planned population for the combined Kleinburg area is about **8,000 persons**.



Kleinburg and Rural Areas continue to be the **eldest** communities within the City of Vaughan. A **quarter** of the Kleinburg population is **above** the age of **55 years** while another quarter is below that of 15 years, making Kleinburg heavily weighted at both ends. **Only a quarter** of the Rural Area population is **under the age of 20 years**.



Of all households in Kleinburg, more than **79%** have an income greater than **\$50,000**. Households that earn an income in excess of **\$70,000** represent **53%** of the community.



Ethnic Composition

Of the entire resident population in Kleinburg and Rural Areas, 96% are Canadian citizens. In contrast to other communities within Vaughan, only 20% of Kleinburg residents are immigrants while 75% is born in Ontario. The immigrant population in Rural Areas stands at 63%. The Kleinburg & Rural Area immigrant population originates mainly from Italy, Germany, the United Kingdom, South Africa and Guyana. Of all immigrants in Kleinburg, 86% came to Canada prior to 1971 while 83% of those in Rural Areas arrived prior to 1981. Of the entire resident population in Kleinburg, a third are third generation Canadians and beyond while 44% of residents in Rural Areas are first generation.



Of the entire Kleinburg population, 52% is employed within the following 4 industries:

- Construction
- Manufacturing
- Wholesale Trade
- Retail Trade.

Those in Rural Areas were also significantly present within the Professional, Scientific and Technical Services sectors.

Housing

A total of 1,444 residential units are found across the communities of Kleinburg and Rural Areas (819 in Kleinburg; 625 in Rural Areas). The vast majority are of the single-detached type (92% in Kleinburg and 99% in Rural Areas), many of these estate-type homes. In terms of housing ownership, 94% and 90% own their home in Kleinburg and Rural Areas respectively. Kleinburg community continues to be recognized as a centre of significant heritage value. With 44% of its population



residing in homes built prior to 1970 and 41% in homes built after 1991, this community continues to provide a wonderful setting of new and old. In rural areas, half of all residents inhabit homes between 1981 and 1990.

Local Economy

Over 80 businesses provide a healthy local employment of approximately 1,200 across Kleinburg & Rural The employment base in Kleinburg is dominated by construction, arts & entertainment and transportation sectors. largest employer is K.G. Beamish Construction Company with 350 employ-At 14%, Kleinburg maintains the highest rate of home-based businesses across the City of Vaughan.



Also, 33% of men and 23% of women are selfemployed in Kleinburg (highest in Vaughan).





Population

The 2001 Census established Maple's resident population at **36,385**. About **20%** of the City of Vaughan's inhabitants reside in Maple. This area now includes, in addition to the historic centre of Maple, three expansion areas directly north, south and east of Paramount Canada's Wonderland.



With the recent influx of new families, Maple has established itself as the **youngest** community in the City of Vaughan. **Three-quarters** of Maple's residents are **44 years** and younger. A quarter of the population is under the age of 14 and half is younger than 30.





With a significant influx of new immigrants, Maple is establishing itself as an ethnically diverse community within the City of Vaughan. A total of 1370 new Canadians made Maple their home over the last census period (1996-2001) arriving from countries such as Pakistan, Russia, Ukraine, Jamaica and India. Of all immigrants within the community, 77% came to Canada prior to 1991 and of the entire resident population, half are first generation Canadians.




Ethnic Composition of the Maple Community



Population

The 2001 Census established the combined population of Thornhill, Concord and Carrville at 71,275. Almost 40% of the City of Vaughan's inhabitants reside in this southeastern portion of the city.

- at 63,020 residents, Thornhill alone represents 35% of all residents across the City of Vaughan. Within the City of Vaughan, Thornhill is bounded by Highway 407, Yonge Street, Steeles Avenue and Dufferin Street. The community of Thornhill further extends into the Town of Markham towards Leslie Avenue in the east.
- Concord, the city's most significant employment area, includes two residential communities south of Highway 7 and Centre Street between Keele and Dufferin Streets.
- Carrville represents the city's most recent expansion area in the east connecting Concord and Thornhill to neighbouring Maple. Eventual residential development will see further expansion towards Major Mackenzie Drive.









Local Economy

Employment in Thornhill is provided principally within the commercial sector. Over 900 businesses employing over 10,000 people are located in Thornhill. The major commercial employment concentration is centred in the Promenade Mall. Local employment is dominated by the retail and service sectors.

Concord represents the City of Vaughan's largest employment concentration. Over 3,300 businesses are located

in Concord providing approximately 70,000 jobs and accounting for 56% of all employment across the city. Across Concord, 10 employment areas are located from Steeles Avenue West to Rutherford Road and from Highway 400 to Dufferin Street. At the centre of Concord, the CN Freight Classification



Yard provides an essential logistics service to area industries.



Shopping & Leisure



Thornhill is served by a variety of retail centres throughout the area. Situated on acres. Promenade Mall is Thornhill's major indoor shopping centre. The mall has over 200 stores ranging from specialty to large department stores. Significant commercial development exists north of Steeles Avenue on Bathurst Street and on Centre Street west of Bathurst Street. Thornhill also has a designated heritage district in the Yonge and

Centre Street area featuring shopping, restaurants and Warehouse-type shopping can be business services. found in the Vaughan Power Centres located at the Highway 7 and 400 interchange where Concord meets Woodbridge. Extending from the Vaughan Corporate Centre, the wide-ranging commercial mix of this area has established it as one of the most important retail destinations in Canada. Large retail brands such as Costco, Wal-mart, Home Depot, RONA, IKEA and Sam's Club are all present in this area. Within close proximity to Famous Players Colossus and AMC Interchange 30 movie theatres, many franchise eateries and fine-dining restaurants along with Dave & Buster's have turned the area into a significant entertainment focal point. Further complementing the area are the accommodation services provided at Dodge Suites and Courtyard by the Marriott hotels.

Vaughan Mills

Vaughan Mills, a unique and dynamic mega-mall currently being developed on a 200-acre site at Highway 400 and Rutherford Road will be the first Mills-type concept in Canada. 




WOODBRIDGE

Population

The 2001 Census established the resident population of Woodbridge at 69,771. About 38% of the City of Vaughan's inhabitants reside in Woodbridge. This area now includes, in addition to the original Woodbridge, two expansion areas: (1) the Woodbridge Expansion Area bounded by Highway 27, Major Mackenzie Drive, Islington Avenue and Rutherford Road and (2) the Vellore Expansion Area bounded by Pine Valley Drive, Major Mackenzie Drive, Highway 400 and Rutherford Road. The planned population for the combined community of Woodbridge is expected to be 124,000 people with most major future growth within the Vellore area.



Three-quarters of Woodbridge's residents are 50 years and younger while half is less than 34.


Income




Ethnic Composition

Of the entire resident population in Woodbridge, 92% are Canadian citizens while 33% are immigrants. A total of 1,400 new immigrants made Woodbridge their home over the last census period (1996-2001) arriving from countries such as India, Russia, Romania, Ukraine, Iraq and Afghanistan. Of all immigrants within the com-

munity, 60% came to Canada prior to 1971 and of the entire resident population, half are first generation Canadians.

> Ethnic Composition of the Woodbridge Community









Approximately 94% of Woodbridge residents own their home. Homes built between 1981 and 1990 account for


36% of residential properties in Woodbridge. An additional 36% live in homes built after 1996.

Shopping & Leisure



Woodbridge is served by both big-box retail centres as well as local, one-of-a-kind shops such as those located at Market Lane. recent developments have welcomed mid-sized retail centres to the Vellore Village and Woodbridge expansion Warehouse-type shopping can be found in the Vaughan Power Centres located at the Highway 7 and 400 interchange where Concord

meets Woodbridge. Extending from the Vaughan Corporate Centre, the wide-ranging commercial mix of this area has established it as one of the most important retail destinations in Canada. Large retail brands such as Costco, Wal-mart, Home Depot, RONA, IKEA and Sam's Club are all present in this area. Within close proximity to the Famous Players Colossus and AMC Interchange 30 movie theatres, many franchise eateries and fine-dining restaurants along with Dave & Buster's have turned the area into a significant entertainment focal point. 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Vellore Village Joint Complex

A new joint facility community centre and high school is currently being built through a partnership between the City of Vaughan and the York Catholic District School Board. Located on a 35-acre site on Villa Royale Avenue, the Vellore Village Joint Complex will share facilities such as gymnasiums, a swimming pool and activity rooms built as a central common area joining the high school and community centre. The surrounding outdoor park will include soccer and baseball fields, as well as tennis courts and a children's playground. The \$39-million project is scheduled to be completed by late 2004.

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
